

urrent world champion, civil rights activist, centenarian, and American hero. Ida Keeling, a 4'6", eighty pound dynamo is a track and field runner who turned 103 this year. Miss Ida, as she is known, became a phenomenon in 2011 at the age of 95 when she set an age group world record with a sub-30 second 60-meter run.

She has set multiple world records for females simply because no female has ever run these events at her age. She set inaugural records at the World Games in France: the Penn Relays: and has set records as the first woman to ever complete a 100-meter dash at 100 years old. Her world records currently total seven.

In February 2017, Miss Ida fell in her home and fractured her femur. After surgery and weeks of therapy, Ida fought and trained her way back to yet another world record just 12 months later.

Ida's story of becoming a world class runner started at the age of 67 with the encouragement of her daughter, Shelley, also a World Champion in Track and Powerlifting. She had become concerned about her mother's health and knew running would help. Ida was suffering from depression brought on by the violent drug-related deaths of both of her sons within two

vears eight months of each other. "This was totally unexpected," says Ida. "They had each served in the military; had married and had children; but the violence related to drugs is an ever-present danger no matter what age a person is." Ida learned after that first race that "exercise is the best medication" out here."

Hardship was an unwanted but not unfamiliar visitor in Ida's life as she explains in her book, a memoir entitled Can't Nothing Bring Me Down: Chasing Myself in the Race Against Time. A longtime resident of Harlem, Ida spent her formative years in the Great Depression, when she had to work various odd jobs as her family's grocery store was forced to close, and they lost their property. Her husband died when he was 42, leaving her with four children to raise. The last two, Laura and Shelley, (Cheryl), from her second marriage, were only seven and nine years old at the time of his death.

Her eldest daughter, Laura, worked as the president of two Urban League affiliates and her youngest daughter, Shelley, an entrepreneur, became CEO of her Wall Street investment and management firm after being a senior clerk to a Justice in State Supreme Court, Manhattan, She also coaches HS Track athletes and trains her mother. She says of her mother, "She is a gallon in a half pint package."

Ida Keeling's compelling story was featured in a segment in the Carl Reiner-hosted documentary, If You're Not in the Obit, Eat Breakfast, on aging over 90, which premiered on HBO in June of 2017. She is definitely a woman with the gumption to function!

MR. AL McCOY

The Voice of the Phoenix Suns

Shazam, Zing Go the Strings, Heartbreak Hotel." An unparalleled style. And the Voice of the Suns. Arizona Sports Radio Play-by-Play Al McCoy has been called the dean of NBA play-by-play announcers. The 2018-2019 season marks his 47th season with the Suns as he calls play-by-play action on Arizona Sports Radio and the Suns radio network. McCoy's tenure with the Suns is the longest consecutive run with one team among NBA broadcasters in league history and is nearly the length of the franchise's existence.

McCoy first hit the air during a preseason game on September 27, 1972, and has been synonymous with Suns basketball ever since. McCoy will forever be remembered for his call in the 1976 Suns-Celtics NBA Finals at Boston Garden when he had to move an inebriated fan off his lap as he was describing "The Shot Heard 'Round the World" by Garfield Heard that sent the game into the third of three overtimes.

A native of Williams, Iowa, a tiny farming community, McCoy was a member of his high school basketball team and was influenced by legendary broadcasters Harry Caray, Bert Wilson and Jack Brickhouse. His own broadcasting career began in 1951 at KJFJ Radio in Webster City, Iowa when he was a freshman at Drake University majoring in drama and speech.

In 1958, he arrived in Arizona to do play-by-play for the Triple-A Phoenix Giants baseball club. He has also covered Phoenix Roadrunners hockey, Arizona State football and basketball and filled in as backup for the Arizona Diamondbacks. Mr.



McCoy added a call of the Phoenix Mercury to his distinguished resume, providing play-by-play on NBA TV for a playoff game on the Mercury's run to the 2014 WNBA title.

He and his beloved wife Georgia, a Valley artist who passed away in 2012, have three sons: Mike, and twins Jay and Jerry. McCoy is an accomplished jazz pianist.



HONORABLE ED PASTOR

Congressman (Ret.)

eacher, congressman, and public servant. Ed Pastor has set and met many milestones in his career.

He grew up in the copper mining town of Claypool, AZ, where his father was a miner. The eldest of three children, Mr. Pastor was the first in his family to graduate from college. With a scholarship to ASU in Tempe, he earned a degree in chemistry. His commitment to helping others began with his first year teaching at North High School in Phoenix in 1966. In 1969, he moved to the Guadalupe Organization, Inc., a non-profit, working with the people of Guadalupe, AZ. He also served as board member for the Maricopa County legal aid society. In 1971, he left to attend the ASU Law School. His work with students, families, and seniors motivated him to spend his life in service to others.

And, indeed, he has. He joined Governor Raul Castro's staff where he worked on civil rights and equal opportunity issues. He served three terms on the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors. Mr. Pastor was elected to Congress in 1991 where he served for 23 years until his retirement in 2015. He was tapped during his congressional tenure to be one of the party's chief deputy whips. Mr. Pastor championed many infrastructure projects in his home state, especially those connected to energy development, water access, mass transit, environmental programs, and he was an advocate for Arizona's American Indian communities.

He has served on almost twenty local and national Boards of Directors including the CPLC, Valle del Sol, National Council of LaRaza, National Association of Latino Elected Officials (NALEO), and Neighborhood Housing Services of America.

Tirelessly, he still serves others: He sits on the Board of the Arizona Nature Conservancy with specific interests in water conservation, healthy forests, and urban heat. Mr. Pastor is Chair of the City of Phoenix 2050 Transportation Commission and involved with the Sandra Day O'Connor Summer Camp.

The first Hispanic from Arizona elected to Congress, Mr. Pastor and his wife, Verma, have two daughters, Yvonne and Laura and four grandchildren. He has indeed spent his life "fighting to give every American the same chance to work hard and get ahead that his country gave him."

HONORABLE RUTH V. MCGREGOR

Chief Justice Arizona Supreme Court (Ret.) - & -

MARIE VAN ROEKEL

[MOTHER & DAUGHTER LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD]

Integrity, accountability and service to the public through an improved legal system. Ruth V. McGregor stands for these virtues and more. Growing up in rural lowa, her formal education began in a one-room schoolhouse. Later after earning her bachelor's and master's degrees at the University of Iowa, she taught high school speech and English, first in Phoenix, Arizona, and then in Selma, Alabama. While in Selma, the school system was transitioning from a segregated to an integrated system.

Returning to Arizona, Justice McGregor entered law school at Arizona State University, graduating first in her class. She practiced employment law for 15 years with the Phoenix law firm of Fennemore Craig and was the firm's first female hiring partner and the first woman to serve on the management committee. In 1981, she temporarily left Phoenix to serve as a law clerk for Associate Justice Sandra Day O'Connor during her first term on the United States Supreme Court.

A product of Arizona's merit selection process of judicial selection, she was appointed by members of both political parties to the bench. In 1989, Governor Rose Mofford, a Democrat, appointed her to the Arizona Court of Appeals. In 1998, Governor Jane Dee Hull, a Republican, appointed McGregor to Arizona's

highest state court. At that time, no woman had served on the court in over two decades. In June 2005, Justice McGregor became Chief Justice of the Arizona Supreme Court after serving three years as Vice Chief Justice.

During Justice McGregor's tenure, she was active in numerous governance areas. Nationally, she served as a member and Chair of the American Bar Association's (ABA) Section of Legal Education and Admissions to the Bar, which accredits American law schools. She participated in the ABA's Central European and Eurasian Law Initiative, including two tours in Lithuania to assist the Lithuanian parliament in drafting a constitution and restructuring the judicial system. In 1995, she helped train members of the Constitutional Court of the Federation of Bosnia - Herzegovina.

As Vice Chief Justice, she helped reform new judge education for limited jurisdiction judges and supported educational efforts designed to maintain the integrity of the courts through her activities with the American Judicature Society and the National Conference of Chief Justices.

While on the Arizona Supreme Court, Justice McGregor worked with other members of the Court and judicial system to establish specialty courts that address critical quality of life issues such as drugs, mental health, and domestic violence. Collaborating, the judicial branch streamlined the criminal justice system, hastened the delivery of justice to defendants and victims of crime statewide, and established Arizona's innovative jury practices, which now serve as a nationwide model.

In 2005, Chief Justice McGregor and the Arizona Judicial Council adopted a strategic agenda to identify the greatest needs of the Arizona judicial system and ways to meet them. The goals included providing access to swift, fair justice; protecting children, families and communities; being accountable; improving communication and

cooperation with the community, with other branches of government and within the judicial branch; and serving the public by improving the legal profession.

After retiring, Justice McGregor worked with organizations dedicated to ending human trafficking and to finding ways for the legal system to better respond to cases involving domestic violence. She maintained strong interest to finding ways to assure our justice system remains independent from political and outside pressures and that our judges make impartial, informed decisions, working with Justice Sandra Day O'Connor to encourage the adoption and development of merit selection systems for the selection of state court judges.

aith, love, commitment to your word. These words aptly describe Marie Van Roekel. She was born on May 4, 1914, in a farmhouse in rural lowa. As the oldest of eight children, she learned early the value of hard work. In 1932, as a condition to attending high school, she promised her father that, after graduation, she would teach for five years. She fulfilled that promise, teaching K through 8 for five years in a one-room country school house.

In 1937, she married Bernard Van Roekel and began her second career as a partner with him in raising five children and operating a family farm. During those years, she always found time to contribute to her community, primarily through her church.


In 1955, with her husband disabled, Marie returned to teaching, this time as a second-grade teacher in the Manson, Iowa elementary school. Although she had previously earned just one semester of college credit, the school administration hired her as a full-time teacher, with another condition: She had to continue working toward her degree. And she did. In 1973, after nearly thirty years of attending summer classes and

night school, and after obtaining credits from eight colleges, she obtained her undergraduate degree.

Marie retired from teaching in 1982, shortly before the death of her husband. She then began spending winters in Phoenix and, in 1993, became a permanent Phoenix resident. Her commitment to volunteer work did not end with retirement. For many years, she volunteered with the Thomas J. Pappas School for Homeless Children, where she used her years of teaching experience to improve the reading skills of many children. She also volunteered countless hours through her church, including a commitment to visiting "the elderly," a commitment that continued until her recent passing.

Marie attributes her long, healthy life to her faith and hard work. Her children would add that we all could benefit by emulating her sense of humor; her love of family; her acceptance of all, no matter in what "category" others might place them; her sense of adventure; and her certainty that one can accomplish anything with enough effort and persistence.




